Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Years ago I received a letter from one who, despite the distance that separates us, continues to care deeply for this congregation. The letter writer asked me “not to let the church die.” No pastor I know of wants that of any congregation she or he leads no matter how rough the going gets at times. But for church to thrive, it takes both Pastor and congregation to make this happen. And it means

continued willingness to listen to what and where the Spirit is leading you as a congregation into the future.

I realize as you do that, change while welcome is not always easy. Receive Pastor Michelle Thorne Mejia with glad and grateful hearts. Work with her and support each other as best you can. In everything you do, remain rooted in Christ. Nurture your relationship with him and you will always be guided in all the good you do.

It is Vern’s and my prayer and hope that you will continue to nurture and to grow the seeds of ministry that we have planted together with the help of God’s grace. Continue to keep yourselves open to new ways of serving the Lord and the people he calls you to minister to going forward.

For my shortcomings and for any pain I may have caused any of you, I ask for your forgiveness. God bless us all as we continue our journeys. Remember always that though far apart, I will always hold you close to my heart and will always love you all and keep you in my prayers.

230th Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church Building Bridges.....Be Love

Pastor MaAn, Jean Strucko, Harriet Macey, and Ann Rawls attended this year's conference. Here are some of their remarks.

Harriet Macey: Once again the conference was a special experience. If possible everyone should go, even if it's just for a day or even part of a day, to see how things work and to enjoy all the surprising talents of the youth and more seasoned members. Standing among 1300 other Methodists singing hymns was very uplifting. During the singing of "*I Need You to Survive*," the laity and the clergy embraced each other and said "I need you to survive." It was very moving.

It was inspiring to hear about all the churches opening up around the world to spread the word of the Lord. I had no idea China had so many Methodist churches dating back from the first two missionaries that arrive there. A delegation of BWC partners from South Korea were present. They sang songs in Korean first, then translated them into English.

This last I will put in quotes for you to get the full meaning. The Rev. Wanda Duckett of Mt. Zion UMC in Baltimore used spoken word poetry to challenge those present into deeper ministry with their communities. "*Let's see, what comes next? Oh yes, Love your neighbor. / That'll preach.../ but it still doesn't reach the wounds or the bruises / Until each one chooses to put the neighbor back in the hood,*" she said. "*We are the ones...We can't hear them from our shrines / Can't see them through closed blinds / Can't love them with closed minds. / The world is waiting and we are the ones.*" Building Bridges...Be Love.

Ann Rawls: This was my first annual conference. There was quite a bit happening. What made an impression on me was the Korean choir and the Africa University choir from Zimbabwe, which the Baltimore-Washington Conference helps support.

There was a dance routine by young people, and Nicole Pleasant, a college graduate, sang. The theme of the 230th conference was *Building Bridges; Be Love*. There were long days and a lot of information to absorb.

On Friday night, there was a collection for Imagine No Malaria. EUMC contributed \$3,000. The conference collected \$1.96 million towards its \$2.1 million promise; this campaign will end in 2016. It used to be that a child died every 30 seconds, now it is every minute. I heard one of the delegates mention that the Malaria nets were making a big difference. Thank you for your generous support of EUMC's contribution to end Malaria.

Jean Strucko: Pastor MaAn and I serve as the voting representatives of Eastport United Methodist Church at our B-W Annual Conference. My article piece will report the business aspects of the Conference.

The 2015 Budget was presented and approved reflecting a 3.1% increase from last year's budget – \$17,331,386. Funds have been allotted for the startup of 12 new congregations. The Benevolence Factor for each church remains at 17.75%, and the Conference is planning on a 92% collection rate.

Five resolutions welcoming and affirming of God's Love to lesbians, gays, bisexual and transgendered (LGBT) persons were passed. (1) The BWC shall support and encourage legislation in West Virginia to include LGBT's in their Employment and Housing Non-Discrimination Act. (2) The BWC will implore the Council of Bishops to cease trials of United Methodist Church clergy for same-sex marriage until we as a denomination work through our differences with respect to this matter of conscience. (3) Agree to disagree on issues

pertaining to gender and sexual minorities and to be encouraged to support LGBT lay members who marry, to refrain from filing complaints against pastors who perform marriages between sexual minorities, and to be in ministry with all people, regardless of their economic status, race, age, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, disability, or immigration status... (4) Inclusive Conference Resolution: Be it resolved that the BWC declare its opposition to all provisions in the "Book of Discipline" that discriminate against or restrict the participation of LGBT people in the United Methodist Church.... (5) Remove all provisions in the "Book of Discipline and Social Principles" that discriminate against or restrict the participation of laity or clergy based on their sexuality identity....

Recommendations and resolutions on Pension and Health Benefits for clergy, Equitable Compensation for Clergy (minimum salary of \$40,760 and minimum housing of \$19,866), Mental Illness and Clergy Disability Benefits, Clergy Medical Leave, and a Resolution to Support Increasing the Minimum Wage were also approved. There were additional reports and resolutions that were discussed, approved, and/or tabled for future discussions. Please let me know if you are interested in further information. I'll be happy to share the information with anyone who is interested. As always, the Bible Studies and Worship Services were uplifting and inspirational. I would like to share one story which I still continue to ponder. In New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina an older woman in one of the large shelters began singing a simple song, "Jesus, Jesus, Jesus" when a young man approached her and said, "Lady, why are you calling on Jesus, shouldn't you be calling FEMA, Chaney, or Obama?" And the woman said, "Because JESUS is the NAME ABOVE ALL NAMES. Now, sit down and let me tell you why."

Can I imagine myself in her position with her reaction; Can you? Think about it. After just losing her home, her worldly possessions and her security, she had the strength and conviction to witness the Good News in those devastating circumstances. At that moment, she was building a bridge from that young man to our Lord. What an amazing witness to the WORD!

In Mission with our Neighbors



On May 25th, as part of Mission's public housing family night dinners (once a month), our group decided to treat the children and adults to a sit down meal, with candle light and soft music. We served them fresh cut fruit, with their choice of 4 sandwiches (egg salad, ham & cheese, turkey, and tuna), as well as a choice of drinks (milk – white or chocolate, iced tea, or water), with cupcakes for dessert. The volunteers were servers, wearing black pants and white shirts with our aprons. The children were especially surprised and several children remarked about the candles and dim lights. They seemed to really enjoy it. Anne Owen joined our group of helpers and everyone had a good time. If you didn't have an appreciation for waitresses and waiters before, one definitely does now. It is hard work trying to get the orders straight.

We do this on Thursday night, 4th week of the month at 5:30 p.m. This June we are doing a pool party (Harbor House pool) with ice cream cones and choices of 3 ice creams and water balloons and games. The children have always enjoyed this. We will restart family dinners in September.



Cyprus Friendship Program

I attended a presentation recently about a youth exchange program that seeks to break the cycle of mistrust that exists between Greek and Turkish citizens on the island of Cyprus. Most Cypriots younger than 40 have grown up with little or no contact with anyone from the other side. The Cyprus Friendship Program, an all-volunteer nonprofit organization, seeks to change that. It pairs teenagers in the ages of 15-17 from the two communities. First, the youths in each pair meet their respective families and friends in Cyprus to learn about themselves and build relationships. Then, for four weeks in July, U.S. families host the pairs. The aim is to promote understanding and communication. The teens engage in activities organized by the program during their stay in the United States. Host families cover the teens' living costs during their visit. Travel expenses are paid by the program and the teens' families in Cyprus. The program screens and selects the participating teens based on their leadership potential, command of English, and openness to being peace builders. Volunteers are being sought now for 2014 and 2015 host families. Hosts can select the gender and age of the teens to whom they open their homes.
